Strengthening Human Rights in New Spaces

In 2018, we launched a new and ambitious <u>theory of change</u>. Developed with substantive input from our Steering Committee and our 2017 member survey, this guiding framework will enable us to better orient our programming to desired outcomes. We move forward with a commitment to promoting **more** *and* better funding for human rights.

In 2018, 305 new individuals participated in our network, bringing our total reach to over 1,800 grantmakers from approximately 450 institutions across 70 countries.

Building Trust and Facilitating Learning

Our 2018 annual conference, "Reimagining Human Rights: New Energy for a New Era," hosted in Mexico City, was our first held outside of the United States in HRFN's almost 25-year history. Attended by over 300 people representing 50 countries, it showcased current global trends and critical perspectives from Latin America and the Global South. The event was featured in Mexico's progressive newspaper, La Jornada, and a new report to the UN Human Rights Council by the UN Special Rapporteur on Human Rights Defenders highlighted the pledge presented by girl activists to funders at the conference closing.

Our 11 webinars—which garnered excellent or very good ratings from 90% of respondents—fostered dialogue on a range of topics, including funders' roles in movement building, climate justice and the threats facing indigenous human rights defenders.

We launched our first-ever *Advancing Human Rights* <u>funding trends</u> <u>analysis</u> at our San Francisco event, <u>Mapping the Money: A Changing Landscape of Human Rights Funding.</u> HRFN members wrote our accompanying blog series, <u>Trends in Human Rights Funding</u>, to illustrate the context behind funding shifts, while a second series, <u>Data in Dialogue</u>, used interviews to highlight a range of funders' perspectives on regional and population-based trends. An in-depth <u>evaluation of the research and related tools</u>, confirmed the impact the initiative has had on funders' knowledge, collaborations, and practices.

BY THE NUMBERS: 2018 HIGHLIGHTS

91% of Advancing
Human Rights research users said
they are more knowledgeable
about the human rights funding
landscape. 50% said it informed
the strategic direction of their
project, program, or organization.

96% of respondents from our 2018 conference evaluation agreed or strongly agreed that it felt like a space for them. 40% of respondents identified themselves as from the Global South or East.

91% of respondents from our 2018 conference evaluation said they built stronger and more trusted relationships at the conference.

Amplifying and Influencing

HRFN provides a unique space for funders to come together and seed new ideas. For example, over the past four years, our Participatory Grantmaking Working Group co-hosted with Ariadne served as a forum for information sharing and experimentation that evolved into a platform for action. In 2018, in partnership with GrantCraft, these funders released a groundbreaking guide Deciding Together: Shifting Power and Resources Through Participatory Grantmaking. Our Foundation Leaders' Circle strengthens relationships among heads of philanthropic organizations and has the potential to shift institutional agendas. Our Early Career Professionals Initiative is building a supportive community of young professionals committed to social justice philanthropy.

In the context of shrinking civic space, HRFN's leadership in the *Funders' Initiative for Civil Society (FICS)*, in partnership with Ariadne and Global Dialogue, remains vital. FICS has led the development of key resources for funders seeking to respond to closing space for civil society, including an April 2018 report "What is closing space grant-making?" which analyzed strategies to support resistance and resilience and a December 2018 report documenting trends in closing space grantmaking.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

HRFN's 2018 operating expenses totaled \$1,190,800. Our 2018 income breakdown was approximately 60% general operating, 21% membership dues, 17% conference (restricted support and registration fees), and 2% in-kind. HRFN received voluntary dues from 95 participating institutions.
